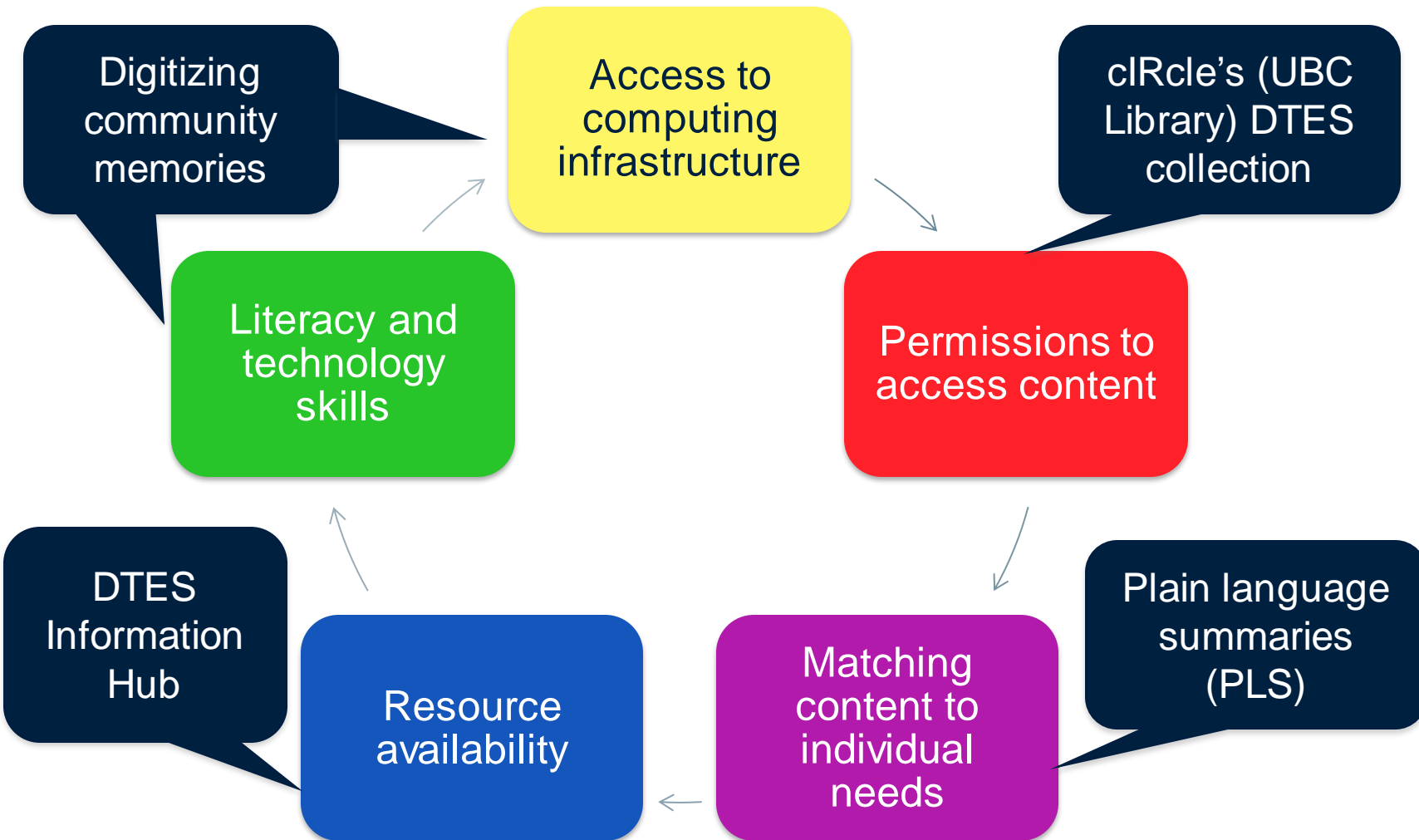
MAKING RESEARCH ACCESSIBLE INITIATIVE (MRAI)
